
Current Long Term Care Status

- Thornbury has only one small 60 bed Long Term Care Home and Retirement Residence
- Errinrung Long-Term Care has 18 new Class "A" beds and 42 "C" beds. The class "C" beds need to be redeveloped to meet current standards by 2025.
- Given the age and small size of Errinrung, this is unlikely to happen, and it will likely be forced to close.



Long Term Care

- While we all want to live independently at home as long as possible, we all know that sometimes life intervenes.
- In the Blue Mountains this will mean that if we need to move into assisted living or long-term care, we will be forced to move away from our friends and the community which we love.
- It is well documented that outcomes are poor for seniors removed from their social support networks.

History of Campus of Care

- After Grey County put the expansion of Grey Gables in Markdale on hold indefinitely and with the imminent closure of Errinrung.
- Our last Council recognised senior care as an urgent priority and tried to work with Southbridge the operator of Errinrung to find a site that would work for them.
- Things did not work out and we recognized that to have any influence on what was going to be delivered for the community we needed to control the bed allocation.
- We lobbied the Ontario Ministry of Long-Term Care to allocate us beds.
- That partnership was announced in January 2022 and the Town was provisionally allocated 160 long-term care beds.
- This was the first time a municipality had been allocated beds.
- Council married this bed allocation with the 32 acre 125 Peel Street property it had purchased in 2021 for \$3,450,000 and completed a request for proposal process.
- In April 2023 the Province approved the first Community Infrastructure and Housing Accelerator in order to expedite the planning process, further enhancing the attractiveness of the project.

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Skyline and peopleCare Communities

- In May 2023 the Town announced it had signed a Letter of Intent (LOI) to develop the 125 Peel Street site with Skyline Development Acquisitions Inc., a very reputable developer, and peopleCare Communities Inc. the operator of the new Meaford Long Term Care home, the successful proponent in the RFP process.
- The LOI included the negotiated purchase price of \$15 million for 18.7 contiguous acres of the 125 Peel Street property

Campus of Care

- Through the RFP and subsequent negotiations, the resulting LOI includes a proposal which gave Council almost everything it had asked for, and which will deliver:
 - a 160-bed long-term care home
 - 90 units (160 beds) of attainable labour force housing
 - 146 units (>250 beds) of retirement living
 - > 300 units of family apartments
 - Centralized amenity hub
 - Daycare facility consisting of 80 spaces
 - Community gardens and open greenspace
 - Pickleball courts and a playground
 - Enhanced naturalized stream corridor and integrated and landscaped trail network

The project encompasses 10 buildings from 1 to 5 stories in height.

Summary

- The Campus of Care provides much needed facilities for seniors, as well as affordable labour force housing and apartments for young families, a type of housing not currently available in the TBM.
- It is being built at no cost to the taxpayer.
- This is an exceptional opportunity for our Town.

Will Council Kill This Project Through Delay

- In January 2022 the Province gave us a provisional allocation of 160 beds until 2026
- In May 2023 the Town announced it has signed a Letter of Intent with the Developer
- Now one year later there is still no signed Development Agreement and at the April 30th COW Council voted to further delay the project by tabling the servicing report.
- A vote for further delay will put this badly needed project in peril
